ANALYSIS

The Department of Public Health is authorized to lease necessary facilities to care for persons afflicted with active contagious tuberculosis and who violate the quarantine or isolation orders of the health officer (Chapter 1091, Statutes of 1949). The amount requested will cover the annual cost of a contract with the Department of Corrections to care for an estimated 25 recalcitrants at the Terminal Island Medical Facility.

This program serves to reduce the spread of tuberculosis by recalcitrants, and is, we believe, a desirable enforcement program.

We recommend approval.

disseminates data; and administers a program of financial assistance for water pollution control. The board consists of the following membership: the State Engineer, the Directors of the Departments of Public Health, Agriculture, Fish and Game, and Natural Resources, and nine appointees representative of the regions of the State and of various interests concerned with water pollution problems.

The Regional Water Pollution Control Boards coordinate programs of abatement and prevention of water pollution in local areas, recommend projects for financial assistance, and prescribe requirements for waste and sewage disposal systems. The State is divided into nine water pollution control regions. The governing policy forming board of each region consists of five members appointed from within the region by the Governor.

ANALYSIS

The amount requested in this item is based upon a continuation of the current program during the 1954-55 Fiscal Year. The increase of \$15,088 over the estimated expenditures for 1953-54 is made up primarily of an increase in salaries and wages of \$12,041 resulting from merit salary adjustments. It should be noted that through more effective use of presently authorized personnel the state board has been able to delete one position of typist-clerk from its budget.

We recommend approval of the request as submitted.

ANALYSIS

In order to develop basic technical data that the agency considers essential to the proper discharge of its responsibilities, the state board has initiated certain research projects on a contractual basis during the past few years. Funds have been requested for the following projects during the 1954-55 Fiscal Year:

1. Investigation of relationship of pollution of ground waters

to rates of percolation______ \$25,000

In 1951-52 the state board contracted for a study of waste water reclamation and utilization in Southern California. The sum of \$25,566 was expended during 1951-52 for this purpose. Although \$25,000 was

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Other Current Expenses—Research—Continued

appropriated in 1952-53 for a continuation of the study, this amount reverted to the General Fund when the research was suspended pending receipt and acceptance of the 1951-52 report. The board requests that \$25,000 be provided in the 1954-55 Budget for possible resumption of the research following evaluation of the final report, which has just been received.

2. Investigation of pollution by leaching______ \$25,000

The portion of this study dealing with leaching from ashes has been completed. The investigation of the sanitary landfill type of dump (mixed refuse and garbage) was commenced during 1952-53 and was to have been completed during the current fiscal year; however, because of an extension in the scope of the study, the board has requested \$25,000 to continue this investigation during the budget year.

3. Systematic study of algae of oxidation ponds _____ \$7,500

A \$2,000 grant of Public Law 845 moneys was made to the state board for a biological study of waste oxidation ponds during 1951-52. The research during that year was exploratory in nature, and it was tentatively planned to continue the project by additional grants at a later date if the results of the exploratory study were promising; however, this means of sponsoring the project disappeared when Congress did not appropriate grant moneys for 1952-53.

State funds (\$7,500) were made available for a continuation of the research during 1953-54. The board states that "the results of the current year's work will not be known until June of next year (1954), but it appears reasonable that this project will pay dividends if continued through two complete years." Upon this basis the board has requested that the study be continued through 1954-55 at a cost of \$7,500.

4. Study of the effects of disposal of sewage sludge into receiv-

ing waters _____ \$2,500

The problem of sewage sludge disposal is becoming increasingly important to California communities. This research is proposed as an initial step in developing a solution to the problem.

The research projects outlined above appear to be justified, and we recommend their approval.

In attempting to prevent pollution of the waters of the State, certain reports on water quality are required by the state and regional boards. Rather than establish a technical staff as an integral part of the boards to perform the necessary field and laboratory work, it was considered more economical to utilize the staffs of other state agencies. Such services include studies of the pollution effects of sewage and industrial wastes, providing the technical information necessary for prescribing discharge requirements, determining the effect of drainage wells on ground waters, and special investigations as required. Contractual services are provided by the Department of Fish and Game, the Department of Public Health, the Division of Water Resources, and the Office of Civil Defense. The amount requested for this purpose has decreased considerably during the past few years as the need for special investigations has diminished.

We recommend approval of the amount requested.
